## April 2022 NCCFFI Report to Clubs & Members, Mark Rockwell

Well, it's that time of year when we all start thinking about spring fishing, be it trout, stripers, bass or other prey. To say the least, this has been the worst start to any year in history relative to precipitation in California. As I write this we're hearing that a good storm is coming in tomorrow, but I've heard that several times before without success. Let's hope we do get at least something to help.

Last year you may remember the summer cautions about not fishing during the mid day if the water temperatures are above 67 degrees, and to consider not fishing at all if the days are hot and the water conditions are not good for fish. All of this is likely to hold true again in 2022. I just hate to think we're going through this again, but sometimes the reality does not meet our expectations. So, let's be cautious if conditions again are bad for cold water fish like trout.

## Klamath Dam Removal Moves into the Home Stretch

I spoke a lot last year about the progress on dam removal in the Klamath, with a start date of January, 2023. Well, we receive the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) in late February. In comparing the impacts of dam removal to current conditions, the DEIS concludes that dam removal provides significant economic, environmental, and cultural benefit to northern California and southern Oregon. This conclusion is



consistent with the findings of two other Environmental Impact Studies that evaluated dam removal over the past two decades. This was the best we could have hoped for from FERC, as it means the agency responsible for dams in America is on our side.

However, it came with 20 recommended actions by FERC that benefit us in the long run because it reduces the chance of legal action and makes conditions better for local communities. The Klamath River Renewal Corp and the signatories (NCCFFI & others) agreed to the listed actions. The problem for all of us was that it pushed the start date into 2023, and dam decommissioning to January, 2024. Here's a link: <a href="https://klamathrenewal.org">https://klamathrenewal.org</a>

All of us are disappointed for this additional year, but also realize that if we have to litigate it's likely to take much more than a year, and the recommendations are important and impactful. So, Pre-construction work will begin in mid-2023 to include alterations to bridges, road work for construction, and other infrastructure changes, as well as water system improvement for Yreka. Included in this pre-construction will be the teardown of Copco II dam, as it is small and does not have silt behind it. So, Copco I will come out next year, with the other 3 out starting in January, 2024, and completion of removal by October that year.

Following the removal, restoration of the dam footprints begins in earnest. **RES - Resource Environmental Solutions** will immediately start to bring back the river banks and surrounding

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watershed to its natural appearance and stability. This is a multi-year project with a 2 years implementation and 7 year monitoring and restoration plan in place. We are lucky to be working with such good contractors and partners.
